




## BOCK WEEK















### APPRECIATING TEACHERS

NIA students recently participated in a research competition hosted by the Hamad Bin Khalifa University, Qatar Youth Science Forum 2023. The event saw 55 teams from high schools across Qatar submit entries, and compete to demonstrate their research and presentation skills in front of a national audience. Their technologies sought to address contemporary issues with innovative thinking, ranging from projects such as biodegradable crayons to reducing environmental waste, and specialised communication and entertainment systems designed to aid quadriplegic patients. NIA was represented by Aiko Gillian, Shafay Sheikh, and Amed Mohammed, who showed resilience and bravery in front of an 'intimidating' panel of professors. Note that, 15 schools had been shortlisted from the original 55; however, the NIA team did not make the final 5 who will visit this year's 64th London Science Youth Conference in early July. The NIA team is to be commended for their fighting spirit.


## CYBER SECURITY WEEK


#### **INTRODUCTION:**











# ECONOMICS







#### **QPSDL RESULTS:**






















MUN is one of those after-school activities where friends become like family. Individuals who initially test the waters, often stay until their final year at school. After a few months and with some training, students can attend conferences at other schools and, if they are lucky, even attend conferences abroad. Unfortunately, the pandemic cast a cloud over face-to-face activities and all of this excitement took the back seat. Online conferences were not the same and the MUN club gradually faded with conferences being as cold as ice.

And then it changed again — the "New Normal". Like cherry blossoms during Spring, the ice melted and we were soon permitted to attend small conferences with safety measures in place. 2022 certainly brought about great excitement, not only for the Fifa World Cup but also for MUN@NIA. Months and months of planning and preparation went into an event for more than 200 guests and club members. From redesigning the logo to advertising on social media, this was undoubtedly one for the books. Junior and Senior members came together and the Executive Team headed by Priscilla Agbozo, Hamdan Khan and Angeline Abril pulled out all the stops for an unforgettable MUN@NIA in February 2023.

Other highlights of the year included Georgetown MUN, the Qatar Leadership Conference and the crème de la crème: THIMUN Qatar. These conferences usually start with mountains of paperwork requesting attendance, approving payments and then registering participants with their exact personal details. On conference days, students (now known as delegates) are transported to venues in Education City to spend their time in their respective groups (known as Committees). Each committee represents a specific Sustainable Development Goal from the United Nations and these could be anything from "Clean Water and Sanitation" to "Gender Equality". Equally, each delegate represents a different country (known as a Delegation) and they have to read through the possible solutions to real-world issues (known as The Resolution). Lobbying and merging are where all the action happens as delegates need to convince delegations to agree with their resolutions. Delegates may only refer to their country when speaking. 


## ASPIKE ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIP


# HOUSE BADMINTON FOR GIRLS






