

A Word from the Head of Secondary



Humanities week created a great buzz at NIA where students competed for prizes in environmental management, geography, history and history of Qatar.






















SCIENCE

In our KS4 IGCSE practical workshop, we aim to equip the aspiring young minds of tomorrow with essential clinical skills required for daily operations in the industry. This hands-on experience focuses on two critical areas: data analysis and data formatting.

Data Analysis

Students will learn how to:

- Collect and Interpret Data: For example, they will gather data from a simulated medical experiment and use statistical tools to interpret the results.
- Use Analytical Software: They will be trained in software such as Excel, SPSS, or Python for performing various data analyses, like calculating averages and standard deviations, and creating visual data representations such as graphs and charts.

Data Formatting

Students will master the skills to:

- Organize Data in Spreadsheets: For instance, they will practice formatting raw data into wellorganized tables, applying functions to automate calculations, and ensuring the data is presentation-ready.
- Prepare Professional Reports: They will learn how to format reports, including the use of proper headings, bullet points, and graphs to clearly present their findings.

This workshop is designed to ensure students not only understand the theoretical aspects but also gain practical skills that are directly applicable in real-world industry settings. By the end of the course, they will be well-prepared to handle the technical demands of their future careers.

At Newton International Academy, our ICT lessons are designed to equip students with essential tech skills through practical, hands-on learning. From creating budget sheets in Excel to drafting essays in MS Word, our students gain proficiency in Office software that is crucial for academic and personal use. Additionally, our curriculum includes website development, allowing students to design and launch their own sites, showcasing their creativity and technical prowess. With practical exams that mirror real-world applications, our ICT program ensures that students are not only prepared for future academic challenges but also for a tech-driven world.




The Power of Giving Back




U14 GIRLS QUESS NETBALL
