
Principal's Message Paul Williamson

We are looking forwards see students enjoying all the different aspects of NIA Secondary school again soon! Enjoy your holidays – Term 3 should be exciting.



HEAD BOY: TALHA SHAHZAD





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


Animals can't speak for themselves

Our school has promoted education on animal welfare during Animal welfare awareness week.



Pupils should be supported to understand that they have rights and personal freedoms, and advised on how to exercise these safely.


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MATHS

During French class, our students were busy depicting Qatari culture through a wonderful array of artworks reflecting the country's rich heritage and tradition.




HONOURING SOME OUTSTANDING STUDENTS IN THE ARABIC LANGUAGE















his second term is a short term yet as a department we have been as busy as usual. In History the Year 7s have been looking at the Middle Ages and commenting on how life has progressed in the last century. The Year 8s have looked at the Atlantic slave trade and how most were transported in horrific conditions from Portugal to Brazil. This is the reason why Brazil speaks Portuguese and the remainder of South America speak Spanish. The Year 9s have been looking at the Weimar Republic and how this affected life after WWI. The Year 10s and 11s have been focused on IGCSE, especially implementing the PEEL paragraph technique and analysing sources. In Geography the Year 7s have been looking at earthquakes and volcanoes and the effect these have on shaping the Earth. The Year 8s have been looking at ecosystems, specifically at how important the tropical rainforests are to us in terms of being the lungs of the planet and providing vital services such as medicines. The Year 9s have looked at tourism and how Qatar will look to transition into tourism after this year's World Cup. The Year 10s and 11s have been doing IGCSEs. The Year 10s looked at Coasts and the importance whilst the Year 11s finished rural environments and went onto fragile environments. In Environmental Management the Year 10s have looked at agriculture and the water cycles as well as water-related diseases. The Year 11s have explored population and ecosystems and their inherent links. In the History of Qatar, the students have explored the role of the family and public health. The Year 8s have looked at the Ottoman Empire and the effect this has had on shaping contemporary Qatar. The Year 9s have looked at human rights and principles.


