I do want to reiterate the importance of regular attendance. Again, this is key to high achievement, particularly during this period of the pandemic. It has been recognized internationally that low attendance is one of the main reasons for underachievement and attendance is monitored by the Ministry every day.

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

#### Key Stage 2 (Years 3, 4, 5, & 6)

Key Stage 2 have had a busy second term. Despite mixing online learning and in-class learning, all the students have made a tremendous effort to engage, take part and learn in many different ways.

In Year 6, we have learnt about the culture of an ancient civilisation - the Maya. We have learnt about the Maya's discovery of chocolate and how their culture helped develop modern-day farming methods. We have learnt about the similarities between the Maya calendar and the modern-day calendar. They both have 365 days months and group the year into seasons. We have also studied and investigated light. We recapped the basics of light sources and the formation of shadows then progressed into understanding how the human eye uses light to see colours. In English, we have written tales inspired by the tales of the Mayas and we have written online newspaper articles on topics that we have researched in our ICT lessons.

In Year 5, we have learnt about the Anglo Saxons — their traditions and how they changed the landscape of the United Kingdom. We learnt about their way of life - what they did for jobs, what they ate, wore and what kind of houses that they lived in. In geography, we have learnt about the world and its countries. Using an atlas, we have located countries on maps and discovered key features about them, such rivers, mountains and lakes. We have also learnt how to use map coordinates to find different landmarks. In English, we have continued to use our talk 4 writing skills to write instructions and stories. We have also been practising our spelling and the correct grammatical features of sentences.

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#### KSR

In Year 4, we have learnt about the Shang dynasty. We were learning about the culture they created and the hierarchy of people in that kingdom. We have learnt about the dress and the craft that was so important at that time. In geography, we have learnt about the rivers of the world and the key features that make a river different from a lake or an ocean. In science, we have learnt about the states of matter, knowing if something is a liquid, gas or solid object. In English, we have improved our writing skills and expanded our vocabulary. We have made WOW walls of words to help use exciting and unique words to describe our settings as well as our characters in our short stories. We have also progressed to using thesauruses.

In Year 3, we have been learning some modern history. We are learning about the nations of Japan and America. We have learnt about their most recent past and how they currently are running. We have also studied these nations in geography, finding them on maps, learning about capital cities, flags and geographical features such as rivers, mountains and lakes. In English, we have been writing letters. The type of letters have been persuasive ones, we have written to Mr Wilson and Mr Stuart, trying to persuade them to improve the school with many different requests such as ice cream stations, swimming pools, petting zoos and Thursdays off.

Our learners have enjoyed a busy term, taking part in 'well-being' week and celebrating weekly reading week in class and online.

I look forward to another exciting term of further progression in term 3! Well done Key Stage 3!





We nurture the talented with distinguished care and we discover the talent. This was demonstrated by our participation in the Qatar National Day celebrations. Our students were amazing!


We will also participate in the Arabic creativity competition which will take place after the Term 2 break.




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#### Student Council
