
and accept the new challenges whether in the classroom, or online. We have learned and even enjoyed it. School has continued to be fun, just in a different way.

Jcience WEEK





In Biology students investigated how dirty their phones are. Pupils swabbed their phones and cultured the microorganisms in an agar petri dish, and compared their growth.
































Photography Competition


The treasure hunt was completed during lesson time as part of their active learning activities.






JUMPING TO NEW HEIGHTS


