- At all crossings you must wait on the footpath, at least one step back from the edge of the road. These simple steps should improve safety around the school. We ask you and your drivers to assist with this.

I would like to thank you for your continued support and say thank you to the large number of parents and students who attended our many Parent Information and subject selection evenings during Term 2, and also to those who attended our rather windy and dusty school fair.


n the 17th of February, our beloved Jawaher



Thailand Trip




