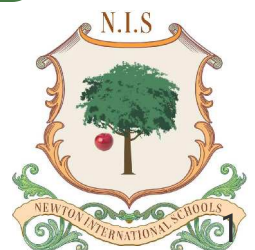


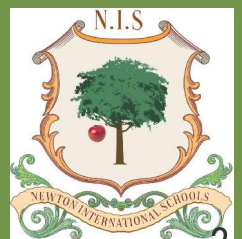
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Intent

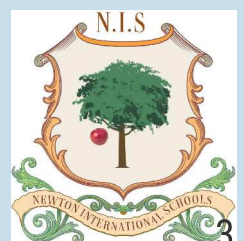

Implementation

EYFS

Girls
McKenzie pinafore or culottes
Boys
McKenzie shorts
All
White shirt with Newton logo
White/navy socks
School sweatshirt/fleece jacket
Plain, flat black leather shoes with no motif.

Primary KS3

Girls
McKenzie culottes or loose fitting navy blue trousers.
Boys
Navy shorts/trousers
All
White shirt with McKenzie tartan collar
Optional white t-shirt (can be long sleeved) may be worn underneath.
White/navy socks
School sweatshirt/fleece jacket (available term 2)
Plain, flat black leather shoes with no motif.

PE

Plain navy shorts/ trousers
School polo shirt, a plain white vest may be worn under shirt (optional)

Girls
One pair of small stud or sleeper earrings
Necklaces, rings, pendants, bracelets or any other type of jewellery is not allowed.
No make-up or nail varnish is to be worn.

Hair Styles

Hair for both girls and boys should be conventional in style. Hair dye is not permitted.
Hair accessories for girls should be in the school colours.
Hijab/scarves should be navy, white or black
No Abayas may be worn by pupils in school



Implementation

Responsibilities

Students

- To ensure the uniform is worn correctly before entering and leaving the school.
- To look presentable throughout the school day.
- To wear the correct uniform during school excursions.
- To ensure that their uniform looks clean and tidy.

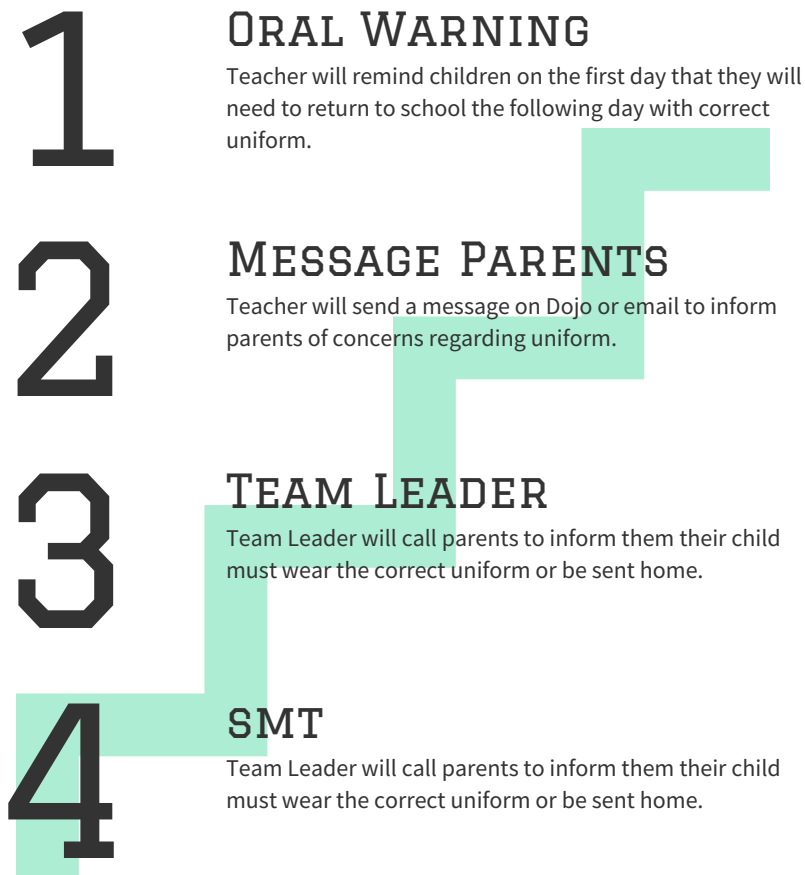
Staff

- To be positive role models and lead by example by dressing professionally.
- To ensure that all students are conforming to the School Uniform Policy.
- To have consistency in the implementation of the Uniform Policy.

Parents

- To adhere to the policy.
- To ensure their children are provided with the correct uniform including the P.E. uniform.
- To write a note explaining why their child is unable to wear the correct uniform for that day.

Note: Students not dressed in their correct uniform will not be allowed to participate on school outings/field trips.



Impact

1

Cohesion

Children coming together from a variety of backgrounds are able to immediately identify a fellow member of their team. A greater sense of equality is created when students expectations of keeping up with the latest trends are removed.

2

Safety

Children are immediately recognised by wearing school uniform. If a member of the community is on site they are immediately recognised. On school trips children are easily spotted amongst crowds.

3

Peer Pressure

Without uniform, children can develop expectations about what should be worn in order to fit into certain groups. At times wearing what they want can create division amongst children.

4

Focus on Character

With a school uniform, children can express themselves in more meaningful ways, which supports creativity and character building. Children can be defined by their character, not by what they wear.
