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Principal's Message



Please see for yourselves in this newsletter! Certainly, we all are proud of what we have achieved and excited about the future plans we have committed to – such as growing the NIA Secondary school further and providing for our seniors and their needs by **opening Year 13 in September 2018**.

The highlights of Term 2 has certainly been our overseas **trip to Laos** where our senior students volunteered to help less privileged locals; **Iceland trip** and **Hague MUN** conference trip. Our NIA MUN teams alsoparticipated in **THIMUN Qatar**, **Georgetown MUN** and **Middle school MUN** this term and our **Destination imagination** teams have been preparing to do as well as possible in the Qatar National finals.

Again our NIA Secondary swimmers won **Inter-Newton swimming gala**, both boys and glsir took part in other various **sports** including Basketball, Netball, Cricket, Football and Athletics. The **Art and DT exhibition** amazed all students, staff and parents who came to our library to see the great talent, effort and skill in NIA Secondary Arts.

Moreover, I am proud to share with you the **Mock 3 results**: **74%** of our Year 11 students achieved **A*-C** in at least 5 subjects, 85% of students studying English 1st language achieved A*-A, 73% achieved A*-A in English literature and 71% achieved A*-A in French.

ICELAND TRIP

Newton International Academy's trip to Iceland was a once in a lifetime opportunity for our students to experience the snow covered volcanic island. The trip took us through all of the major iconic locations from the black beaches of the south, to the ice caves of Langjökull glacier. Hotel Eldhestar's geothermal heated floors gave the students a warm and eco-friendly experience to remember.

















LAOS TRIP



Five Year 12 students had the pleasure to go on a service trip and represent Newton International Academy. The trip was organised with the NGO: World Volunteer. The aims of the trip were multiple. First, the students needed to adapt and be informed of a culture and sets of traditions that were completely different from theirs. Then, they had to live like locals in a village. Finally, the students had to put their time to greater use by building an eco-dorm.

Indeed, in Laos, it is quite common for many children to walk up to 5 hours a day to attend school. What many take as a given in their countries is in actuality a privilege. Therefore, for seven hours a day, students dedicated their time to creating and shaving bricks, building walls, placing windows and even creating cement made of mud. The students took this challenge to heart and managed to be - while being the smallest group working with World Volunteer - to achieve the most work in five days.



Saif Azzam, one of the volunteer explains: "We took hikes that an average Lao villager has to take twice a week after he leaves primary school. Surprisingly, we were all physically overwhelmed from an activity a 13 year old villager was accustomed to. More importantly, during our trip, we were able to learn about the daily lives of people in another culture that at many points we'd call hardships. Because of this we were able to appreciate the the luxuries we have in our lives back home."

In the process, the students also had some leisure time. They visited the famous Kuang Si Falls but also the UXO Lao Visitors Centre, several UNESCO world heritage site, and of course, the famous Mekong river. The trip was as informative as physically challenging. Unlike any other service trip, the students truly delved into the life of the locals. Ranging from sleeping on the floor like locals, eating with them, bathing with buckets and cold water like them, and - most importantly - communicating with them; the students were fully immersed in a world they knew little or nothing about.

Overall, the students worked with great enthusiasm and energy. After four days of exhausting work, the students could only be proud of having achieved their goal of helping others.





HAGUE TRIP



"The Hague, City of Peace and Justice, is closely associated with the United Nations. It is the seat of the International Court of Justice (ICJ), the International Criminal Court (ICC), the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia and the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW). In addition, The Hague is the seat of the Dutch government and many national and European Union institutions. It is also the residence of the Dutch Royal Family, which has been very supportive over the years. Her Majesty Queen Beatrix was guest of honor at the XV and the XX Anniversary Sessions and Crown Prince Willem Alexander, a former delegate himself, formally opened the XXV Anniversary Session in 1993 and the Annual Session in 2000.

Although the majority of participating schools are English-language-medium schools, a large number of participants attend schools where languages other than English are the medium of instruction. For such students, THIMUN offers an excellent opportunity to expand, develop and put into practice English language skills, on an informal as well as a formal level. All the associated activities such as preparing resolutions, lobbying and debating are carried out in English and a high standard is demanded in the formulation of ideas, whether in writing resolutions or in arguing and debating with fellow students."

































Newton International Academy's Annual Art and Design Exhibition displays exampupils' talent and creativity.






La Galette des Rois has been very special this year. Primary students joined Secondary students to celebrate the day.

WHY ARE WE LEARNING FRENCH?

And there is absolutely no need to emphasise how important and beneficial it is to learn a new language because I am sure that all of us are already aware. We just need to set aside any negative attitude telling us that it is 'too difficult' or 'too boring' to learn a language, because with a little bit of hard work and commitment, anything is possible! WHY ARE WE LEARNING FRENCH?



Qadir: When it came to choosing my IGCSE options, I chose to study a language for several reasons. It's important to bear in mind that knowing a language is a valuable asset in life and a skill which universities look at. The basics in the language of French were already there for me, and I was set to pick it as an IGCSE course.

When learning French, one must develop their reading, writing, listening and speaking skills. I've come to realise that grammar is something many neglect, yet it's just as important as learning vocabulary. Listening and speaking are harder to grasp, but regular practice helps overcome that difficulty. Fortunately, the lesson structure and the resources available are more than enough to help me. In the end, learning French simply requires the same effort as the rest of the IGCSE subjects.



Abdulazeem: The French IGCSE course is based on the linked language skills of listening, reading, speaking and writing, and these are built on as learners progress through their studies. The course aims to offer insights into the culture and civilization of countries where French is spoken, thus encouraging positive attitudes towards language learning and towards speakers of foreign languages.
